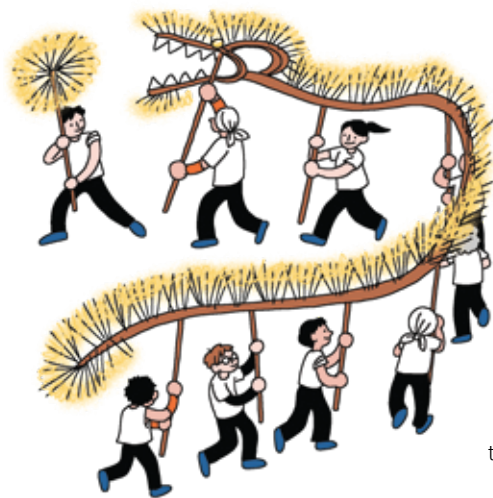

Tai Hang Fire Dragon Dance is an age-old ritual for Mid-Autumn festival commemorating the victory over a historic plague. Experience the awe-inspiring 67-meter dragon, paraded through Tai Hang by 300 performers, crafted meticulously with incense sticks.

Recognized as a national Intangible Cultural Heritage, the Fire Dragon begins its journey at Lin Fa Kung Temple, paying homage to the Goddess of Mercy on the night of the full moon. Don't miss the opportunity to be captivated by the vibrant traditions of Tai Hang.

Central Market ⑥

Discover Central Market, a Grade III historic building constructed in 1939. Renovated from one of Hong Kong's oldest wet markets into a vibrant lifestyle hub in 2021, this landmark tantalises taste buds with local and international flavours, while also serving as a shopping heaven for local crafts and souvenirs. 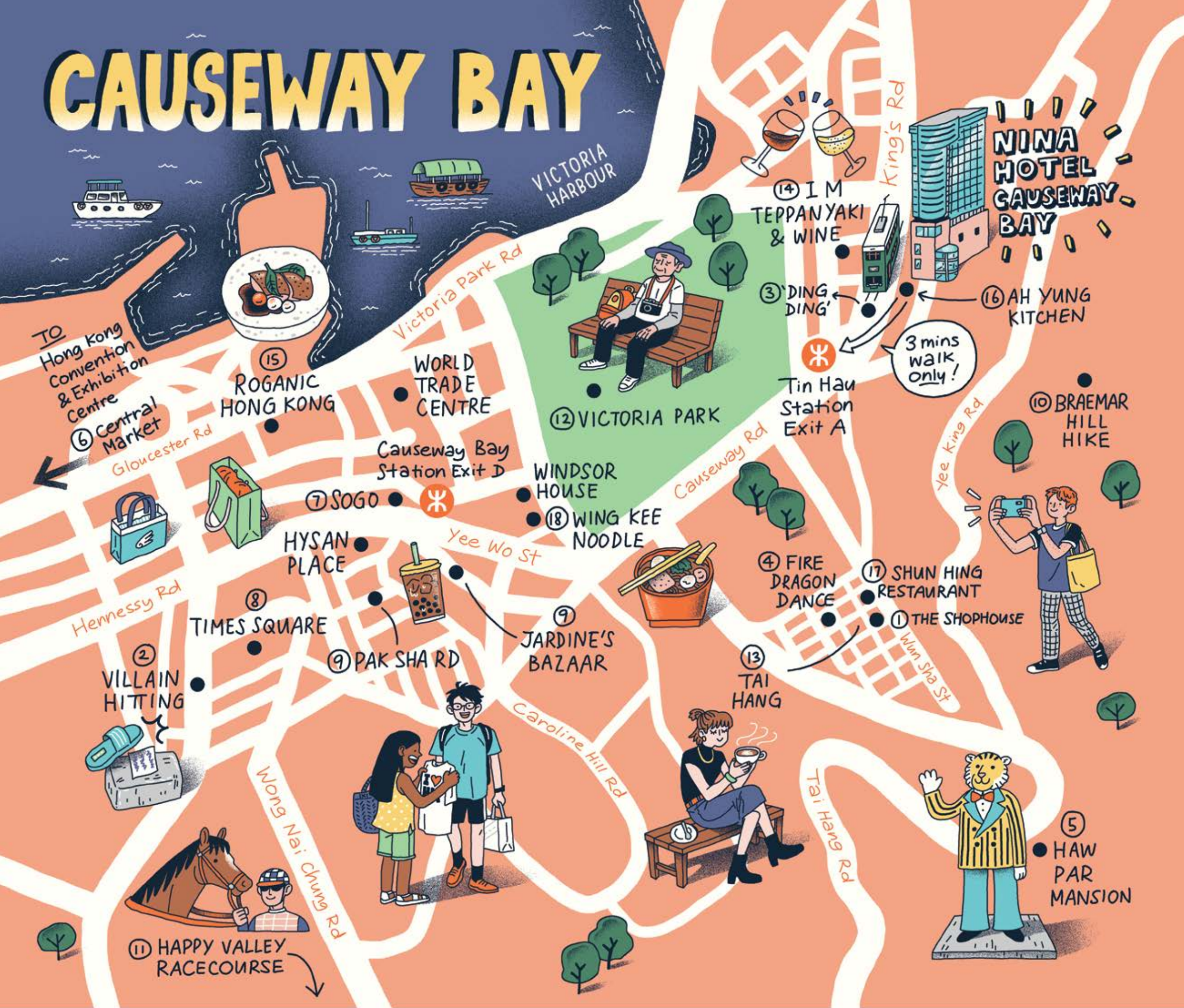
